Logo Design

The shape of the logo for this Conference is a koru. The koru is said to represent new beginnings, growth and regeneration.

"Ka hinga atu he tete-kura ka hara-mai he tete-kura" "As one fern frond dies, one is born to take its place".



In Maori design, the koru has a dual meaning. It is commonly used in Maori art as a symbol of creation due to its fluid circular shape. Based on the unfurling fern frond of the native New Zealand silver fern, the circular shape of the koru conveys the idea of perpetual movement. Its inner

coil, the corm, with its rolled inner leaflets, suggests a return to the point of origin. In the larger scheme, this is a metaphor for the way in which life both changes and stays the same.

The koru is also said to represent new life. Literally speaking, the baby fern frond slowly unwinds over its adolescent life as it grows into a mature frond. It then opens into a brand new leaf on the silver fern plant where it ages and then dies. This is the fern frond's life cycle. When it is at the frond stage, it can be associated with a baby in form; this is how people associate the koru design with new life.

Depending on whether you look at the koru on our logo as starting with the Silver fern motif and Dominican star or ending with it, the logo represents our journey. Our Dominican traditions gift us with the desire to search for our God, our Heart, our Truth in our relationships with whom we meet and interact while on our Life Journey.

Keynote Speakers

Laurie Brink, O.P., Ph.D.

Catholic Theological Union Chicago, IL, USA

A Dominican Sister of Sinsinawa, Laurie Brink, O.P., is Professor of New Testament Studies at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago, and an associate editor of *The Bible Today*. Her current research and pedagogical interests are contextualization and hermeneutics. As a Dominican, she is keenly interested in promoting biblical literacy and to that end has given presentations and workshops throughout the United States and in Australia,



Bolivia, Jamaica, the Philippines, and Trinidad & Tobago. Her recent publications include: What does the Bible say about Friendship (New York: New City Press, forthcoming); Living the Word: Scripture Reflections and Commentaries for Sundays and Holy Days Year C (Franklin Park, IL: World Library Publications, 2018); "From Wrong-doer to New Creation: Reconciliation in 2 Corinthians," Interpretation 71 (2017): 298-309; "Presence, Prophecy, and Passion: The Biblical Foundations of Apostolic Religious Life," Religious Life Asia (2017): 1-24; Biblical Foundations of Spirituality. Touching a Finger to the Flame. 2nd. Ed. (Barbara E. Bowe, with contributions from Laurie Brink and John R. Barker; New York: Rowman & Littlefield, 2017); and "The History and Archaeology of the New Testament," The Catholic Study Bible, 3rd ed. (New York, NY: Oxford University Press, 2016). She also has produced three audio/DVD series for Now You Know Media: Christ's Seven Last Words, Philippians, and Acts of the Apostles. For five seasons, Brink served as a senior staff member on the Combined Caesarea Expeditions, working in archaeology at Caesarea Maritima, Israel, and she frequently leads CTU's Bible Study and Travel Programs.

Keynote 2 Thursday 1.30 Journeying with Jesus: Lessons from a Master Teacher

In the Gospels, the most frequent self-designation of Jesus is that of "Teacher." From his invitation to ordinary folks, to his welcome of the least among us, to his engaging use of the ordinary to explain the extraordinary, Jesus demonstrates by word and deed the work of a master teacher. This presentation highlights the aspirational and inspirational aspects of Jesus' teaching and invites participants to reflect on their own experience as teachers in light of his example.

Keynote 3 Friday 9.30 Journeying with Dominic: Lessons from a Master Preacher

Taking to heart Jesus' invitation to "Come follow me," Dominic's life was an extended road trip into hostile villages, along the way of the physically and spiritually hungry, and off the paved path of disaffected religious authorities. This presentation demonstrates that Dominic's mission of preaching and teaching draws inspiration from his own prayerful journey with Jesus and the Apostles. Like Jesus, Dominic knew well the cost of seeking truth and proclaiming peace, and his example provides direction for all those who seek to build a more holy and just world and church.

Sr. Laurie Brink O.P. & Sr. Betsy Pawlicki, O.P. Following in the Footsteps of the Master Teacher:

Practical Implications for the Classroom. It's one thing to hear about Jesus as a Master teacher. It's a whole different experience trying to apply his methods in a 21^{st} century classroom. This workshop provides an interactive opportunity to share ideas on how to introduce and foster gospel and Dominican values in the learning environment.

Sister Betsy Pawlicki, O.P. is on the leadership council for the Dominican Sisters of Sinsinawa, Wisconsin.

After earning her law degree, Sr. Betsy served as associate general counsel for the Illinois Education Association, advocating for teacher rights and quality public education. An adjunct faculty member with the Leadership Roundtable (an organization of laity, religious, and clergy working together to promote best practices and accountability in the management, finances, communications, and human resource development of the Catholic Church), Sr. Betsy presents workshops on best human resources practices for new pastors and parish administrators. In addition to her legal pursuits. Sr. Betsy also earned a Masters in Pastoral Studies.

Representative on the Qld Government's SEQ 2001 Urban Planning Advisory Committee (2years); two terms of 5 years as Deputy Leader of her Religious Congregation; Executive Director of Catholic Religious Australia (3 years). She holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree, and Graduate Diplomas in Theology, Religious Education, Education for Justice, Community Development, and Psychological Counselling. Biblical Studies were undertaken at Tantur Ecumenical College, Jerusalem.

Currently, she is a member of Australian Catholic Religious Against Trafficking in Humans (ACRATH), and she is a Director on the Board of St Ursula's College Yeppoon, Qld.

Whatungarongaro te tangata toitū te whenua

Facilitators: Whaea Steph, Ngai Tahu tangata tiaki (guardian of a specific land area or water) and Jarlath Kelly, Principal, Verdon College

As people disappear from sight, the land remains This whakatauki (Maori proverb) demonstrates the holistic values of the Maori, and the utmost respect of Papatuanuku, the mother of the earth. Dominican study is a spiritual work of mercy aimed at facilitating a more effective communication of the truth that saves, an example of the dual command of love of God and love of neighbour. Our Dominican tradition of study urges us to develop an active understanding of others and in particular the traditions and understandings of indigenous peoples, including an understanding of the interconnection between the spirit of the people and that of the land. Developing our understanding of indigenous spirituality and values that co-exist with Catholic values and Dominican spiritualty allows us to enter more fully into the culture of all peoples within our schools and faith communities. In this workshop we will explore the connections found in tikanga (Maori ways of doing things) and kaupapa Maori (Maori set of values). These are informed by the tangata whenua (people of the land) view of connection to Te Ao Maori (the Maori world). They are a context for opening our minds to the views and understandings of indigenous people. Alongside our work as Dominicans, to preach and witness these truths, we strive to work with others to develop our collective understanding of the importance of this kaupapa within our schools and faith communities. This is critically important for this discussion.

Lorraine Frances-Rees: Principal at St Joseph's Oamaru: Dominican Tradition in the Twenty First Century This workshop will explore the challenges of living true to our Dominican tradition today. We have increasing dilemmas with accessing and providing for learning support, managing challenging behaviours, supporting families in a range of situations, using modern learning environments and tools and working within an increasingly secular system with a wide variety of demands and constrictions. What is a

Veritas response? How can we preach the Gospel in the tradition of our forbearers and be sure we are neither diluting nor corrupting our tradition while continuing to meet the needs of the moment? How can we endeavour to form our students as prayerful, community-focused, knowledgeable witnesses to the Gospel? We will draw from the wisdom of the group to address some of these questions in light of our own schools and communities.

Callan Goodall: Get a Life – Granting Permission

In the modern world where we never switch off, schools have become places of systemic self-imposed workaholics. This talk will look into how school leaders need to grant permission for their staff to 'Get a Life' and conversely why staff need to accept this gift without guilt. Callan is the Principal at St Patrick's Primary School in Invercargill.


Sister Judith Robinson O.P. Earth. A Living Being. Pick up a packed lunch and visit the **Korimako Dominican Ecology Centre.** This is a five acre farmlet located near the northeast entrance to Invercargill. It began in response to a need expressed by some of the local community. Therefore it was set up to be a place of hope where care for the earth and all its inhabitants would be honoured through prayer, work and study. As Dominicans we hoped to find ways of addressing the injustices of our time and place and in particular respond to the needs of the local community. Korimako continues to unfold to the ever changing needs of this bioregion. **Workshop limited to the first 30 people**.



Liz Hellwig: How "saints" answered new needs in their new times- how do we "saints" do this work today following their risk-taking for the sake of the Gospel?

Mary Horn is a Dominican Sister, one time primary teacher, now painter and organic gardener. Born in Waimate Aotearoa New Zealand in 1937, and professed in the New Zealand Dominican Congregation in 1959. Mary has lived and taught in a number of places in New Zealand. She began painting in 1992 when her time as Congregational leader was finished, and has worked and lived at Teschemakers, North Otago, since then.

Her painting explores the spiritual landscape that is the journey we essentially make alone and with others in a paradox of certainty and uncertainty, order and chaos, with continual beginnings and endings. This is expressed in colour and image that moves beyond visual reality



Mary won the Hope and Sons Award in Dunedin in 1998. She has had a number of solo exhibitions at the Forrester Gallery Oamaru, Grainstore Gallery Oamaru, Peter Rae Gallery Dunedin, Sailsbury House Dunedin Rosslyn Gallery Dunedin, Hope St Gallery Timaru, Sailsbury House Dunedin, as well as group exhibitions. In 2000 travelled to Rome for a group exhibition of international Dominican Artists at the Minerva for the 600th centenary of the death of Fra Angelico. 2016 Her painting of Sigrid Undset was one of 16 hung in Santa Sabina Basilica Rome to celebrate the 800 year Jubilee. 2017 took part in the Dominican Artists exhibition at the Adelaide Fringe Festival.
